Bangladesh has stressed the need for signing free trade agreement (FTA) among the BIMSTEC member states to open a new horizon in trade for the region.

Commerce Minister Tipu Munshi came up with the statement while addressing the inaugural function of a two-day BIMSTEC Expo in Mumbai, India on Wednesday, reports BSS.

"Sincere cooperation from the BIMSTEC member states is needed for signing a FTA. If the FTA is signed, it will open a new horizon in the trade sector of Bangladesh, India, Myanmar, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Nepal and Bhutan," the minister said.

Underscoring the need for reducing the trade cost in supplying goods to the consumers at a tolerable level of price, the minister urged all concerned to take such initiative which will benefit the consumers.

Additional Secretary of the Indian Ministry of External Affairs Dr Virander Kumar Paul addressed the inaugural function as the guest of honor while ICCI Director General Dr Rajeev Singh delivered welcome.
